
Outreach Ministry Meeting – The Outreach Ministry will be meeting on **January 19** at 11:30 AM in the library.

Social and Environmental Justice Ministry - It has been 4 years since the Social and Environmental Justice Ministry ("SEJ") formed with the mission of educating the congregation about issues that impact our community and each other. After a survey was conducted that provided direction regarding topics of interest to the Congregation, we set out to present a wide variety of topics including racism, political vitriol, environmental impacts, human trafficking, and firearm safety, to name a few. We also raised awareness by celebrating and speaking to awareness months, hosting a group read, held the first community wide Pride picnic in the area, and sponsored a "green" festival. These are just some of the actions that have been taken by SEJ in the past four years.

It is time for us to once again ask, what are you interested in learning more about? This time we will create a two-step approach to our survey. First, for the next three weeks we will have a flipchart posted in Fellowship Hall. This flip chart is intended for people to put down ideas of potential topics that they would like to explore. No idea is too silly or strange; we want everyone to just brainstorm the topics in which they have an interest. Based on the ideas generated, we will then send out an electronic survey monkey (hard copy will also be available) to have people rank the ideas so we can tell what the majority of the Congregation is interested in. We will begin the survey in February, and anticipate that you will have two weeks to turn in your results.

Your opinion is critical for the SEJ to be able to present content and programs that are of interest to the community. We are not asking you to do anything to bring the content to life, just to tell us what you want us to do.

We look forward to hearing all your ideas.

QPR stands for Question, Persuade, and Refer. Three simple steps that anyone can learn to help save a life from suicide. Just as people trained in CPR and the Heimlich Maneuver help save thousands of lives each year, people trained in QPR learn how to recognize the warning signs of a suicide crisis and how to question, persuade, and refer someone to help. Each year thousands of Americans, like you, are saying "Yes" to saving the life of a friend, colleague, sibling, or neighbor. QPR can be learned in our Gatekeeper course in as little as one hour. If you are a: Parent, Caregiver, Veteran, Educator, Teenager, or a compassionate human, you are welcome to attend this workshop.
